Shortly after I retired from practicing law and we moved from Pennsylvania to Front Royal in 2008, my wife, Mary, and I helped found the Friends of Shenandoah River State Park. I became very active in the Park's Junior Ranger day camp program and thought it would be good to broaden my knowledge of Virginia's natural environment. I was in the 2010 class of the Shenandoah VMN Chapter. I did most of my hours at Shenandoah River State Park (you can still see a number of my postings as toad2415 at riverparkfriends.org) continuing to help manage the Junior Ranger program and numerous other Friends activities. Along the way I oversaw two Garden Club of Virginia grants for the Park - the first for the installation of a 1.4 acre pollinator meadow with a bee program and the second for the rehab of the visitor's center native plants landscaping. Since moving here in April 2020 (never move during a pandemic!) I have worked with a former NNMN member, Jane Henley, at RW-C to establish a nature education kiosk at our hiking trails. NNMN Volunteer opportunities include: **Campsite Cleanup:** Site cleanup of primitive camping site located along Mud Creek Trail for prospective campers. Date TBD Saturday, Sept 11, morning: Fishing 101. Led by Park Staff. This is a good activity for MNs who have an interest and knowledge in ichthyology, phenology and water quality. Saturday, Sept 11, afternoon: Butterfly Safari led by NNMN. (GS troop attending is working on a Butterfly Garden down in Pole Green). This is a good activity for MNs who have an interest or experience with butterfly identification, quarterly butterfly counts held on the NNK and butterfly garden habitat Sunday, Sept 12, morning: Caterpillars Count! led by NNMN. A small group of NNMN have just completed a pilot program at BISP. This is a good activity for MNs to share how to be a citizen scientist, what is phenology, bird food is more than caterpillars! and what information the scientists are looking to find.



As most of you know, our monthly general meetings this year have featured a look back on the basic training course cohorts that have resulted in our group of Northern Neck Master Naturalists. This is a salute to the classes we have honored so far in 2021, with several more yet to come.

The Northern Neck Chapter of Virginia Master Naturalists was formed in 2007. Seven charter members of that first class are still Chapter members today: Faye Andrashko, Paula Boundy, Maggie Gerdts, Darleen Nelson, Earline Walker, Temple Moore (current Historian), and Charlene Talcott (current Past President)

The SECOND BTC Course was held in 2009. There were 16 graduates of that class. Eight are still ACTIVE members today: Bill Arnold, Bobbie Burton, Margaret Ann Fohl, Nancy Garvey, Beth Kendrick, Ted Munns, Pam Narney, and Lolly Riley

The THIRD Basic Training Course was held in 2010. There were 20 graduates of that class. Four are still active members today: Judith Holyfield, Lucy Hottle, Lise Maring, and John Narney (current VMN Liaison)

The FOURTH Basic Training Course was held in 2012. There were 14 graduates of that class. Two are still ACTIVE members today, Gail Drake and Cathy Sachs

Fully vaccinated individuals are not required to wear a mask in most settings, however fully vaccinated people should wear a mask in public indoor settings in areas of substantial or high transmission. Clean Virginia Waterways, sponsored by Longwood University, is part of the Ocean Conservancy's International Coastal Cleanup. From August-November, families, organizations, and community groups work to clean up litter in and around our waters. Not only is the cleaning up a helpful way to prevent more trash from polluting, but those who clean up and report the different types and amounts of trash recovered are joining other citizen scientists in providing the data to help find solutions to the pollution problem. Data may be collected on paper forms or by using the Ocean Conservancy's "Clean Swell" app. The NNMN hope to schedule and hold a number of cleanups in the Northern Neck during the next few months, but we need site captains to plan and host the cleanups.
