2014 BASIC TRAINING CLASS

VMN CONTINUING EDUCATION WEBINAR SERIES

Virginia Master Naturalist volunteers are required to receive eight hours of continuing education, formerly known as Advanced Training, every year to become certified or maintain their certification. However, meeting this requirement can be difficult for volunteers that serve in rural areas of the state where continuing education opportunities may be limited. Therefore, Virginia Master Naturalist is pleased to announce that it has started a "Continuing Education Webinar Series" to support this volunteer requirement and to also provide additional ways for our sponsoring agencies and partnering organizations to connect with our volunteers at the statewide level.

The program will host a new webinar every month throughout the year. The next two webinars will provide needed training on the **Volunteer Management System (VMS)**, the software used by our volunteers to record hours. These will be presented on **February 24** for volunteers and **March 4** for administrators. Pete Pfeiffer, a member of the Arlington Regional chapter, will guide volunteers through the online system and discuss available software features. Then, on **April 14**, Dr. Marie Struder, the Director of Learning and Education with the Encyclopedia of Life, will be presenting: "**Finding Synergies for Biodiversity Awareness and Conservation: How Can the Virginia Master Naturalist Program and the Encyclopedia of Life Support Each Other?**" We

will continue to post information related to future webinars on the Virginia Master Naturalist website (<http://www.virginiamasternaturalist.org/training.html>) under the "Continuing Education Webinar Series" link. We look forward to using this online educational tool to continue to connect our volunteers and the conservation organizations they support.

Hours for the webinars are recorded to the *VMN-Advanced Training Webinar Series* project. This is the last entry in the list of projects on the VMS.

GOOD SNAKE, LIVE SNAKE, CONTINUED

Pam Narney's excellent article in the last newsletter brought up the information of herpetological county by county data on the VHS website. To refresh, the Virginia Herpetological Society website is, logically enough, www.virginiaherpetologicalsociety.com. This site contains a wealth of information but this article is concerned only with species distribution which was mentioned in the previous article.

There is a very specific and detailed process whereby you can add to your county/city data base of reptiles and amphibians (herps). To start, go to the VHS website and click on "county/city herp lists" in the left hand margin column. Input your desired county location and check the list against any additions you wish to submit. If you have an addition of any herp not presently listed, you must have a photo(s), or the actual creature to submit. If you have obtained that requirement, write a brief synopsis of when, where and how you found the animal and include detailed geographic location such as road intersection and

geographic coordinates. Also include weather, time of day and any other information which you might find helpful to identify creature and habitat. Use the Latin name followed by the common name as the title of the submission.

After collecting the necessary information, submit all to both VHS and to Dr. Paul Sattler at Liberty University. I suggest that prior to submitting to Dr. Sattler, you first send your data and visual evidence to the VHS for the experts to check and verify your identification. The volunteers at VHS are very helpful in assisting you with the proper format. Dr. Sattler makes the final decision as to whether your species is correct and he will edit or return your description for any corrections.

If you decide to submit a missing species, I will be glad to assist in creating the documentation. Through trial and error with previous submissions, I have at least learned how to make most of the mistakes. You can email me at templemoore@verizon.net if you would like any assistance.

GREAT BACKYARD BIRD COUNT

February 14-17, 2014

Launched in 1998 by the Cornell Lab of Ornithology and National Audubon Society, the Great Backyard Bird Count was the first online citizen-science project to collect data on wild birds and to display results in near real-time.

Since then, more than 100,000 people of all ages and walks of life have joined the four-day count each February to create an annual snapshot of the distribution and abundance of birds.

It's as easy as 1, 2, 3!

1. [Register for the count](#) or use your existing login name and password. If you have never participated in the Great Backyard Bird Count or any other Cornell Lab citizen-science project, you'll need to [create a new account](#). If you

already created an account for last year's GBBC, or if you're already registered with eBird or another Cornell Lab citizen-science project, you can use your existing login information.

2. Count birds for at least 15 minutes on one or more days of the GBBC. You can count for longer than that if you wish! Count birds in as many places and on as many days as you like—one day, two days, or all four days. Submit a separate checklist for each new day, for each new location, or for the

same location if you counted at a different time of day. Estimate the number of individuals of each species you saw during your count period.

3. Enter your results on the GBBC website by clicking "[Submit Observations](#)" on the home page. Or download the free [GBBC BirdLog app](#) to enter data on a mobile device. If you already participate in the eBird citizen-science project, please use eBird to submit your sightings during the GBBC. Your checklists will count toward the GBBC.

REPORTING YOUR HOURS

It's a new year and the recertification clock has been set back to zero. Master Naturalists need to record 40 hours of volunteer time and 8 hours of Continuing Education annually to be certified/recertified. Although it is still early in the season for most outdoor activities there are other opportunities to get hours: board and general meetings count as admin time, volunteers are needed to man the display at the upcoming Master Gardeners' Seminar, programs following meetings and State provided webinars count for Continuing Education hours.

NOTES FROM CHARLENE

Belle Isle State Park will be holding a Project WILD workshop on Saturday, March 22, from 9 to 3.

The *Project WILD K-12 Curriculum and Activity Guide* focuses on wildlife and habitat. Each Project WILD activity contains all the information needed to conduct that activity including objectives, method, background information, a list of materials needed, procedures, evaluation suggestions, recommended grade levels, subject areas, duration, group size, setting, and key terms. A glossary is provided as well as an index cross-referenced by topics and skills. A list of correlations with Virginia SOLs will be provided.

This program is recommended for teachers, informal educators, and others that work with students. Each participant will receive the *Project WILD* Guide and lunch.

A fee of \$10 applies. Pre-registration is required by calling 464-5030.
