to start a book club, so that we can read a book and have a discussion that serves as an hour of CE credit.





Aldo Leopold Film 'Greenfire' Center of Humans and Nature and U.S. Forest Service have made the FULL FILM available FREE

to everyone! Although we don't often approve documentaries, this one comes highly recommended, was used in previous BTC classes, and fits well with our curriculum mandate to study Naturalists of note. An entertaining and enlightening documentary that explores the life and transformation of Aldo Leopold's thinking, and the dawn of a land ethic for all.

The film describes the formation and evolution of Leopold's idea, exploring how it changed one man and later permeated all arenas of conservation. By presenting examples of the deep impact of his thinking on current conservation projects around the world, the film challenges viewers to contemplate their own relationship with the natural world.

Green Fire uses photographs, correspondence, and other documents from the voluminous Leopold Archives, along with historical and contemporary film footage of important Leopold landscapes. Also featured is commentary from many influential conservation leaders, including three of Leopold's children – Nina, Carl, and Estella – and renowned scholars, environmental writers, scientists, policy makers, and business and non-profit leaders. http://bit.ly/2YPN9FE
